

Author notes 2026

General

A prerequisite for submitting a manuscript is that the work has not yet been published or submitted for publication elsewhere. In addition, all co-authors and the institution where the work was produced must agree to the publication, either implicitly or explicitly.

Permissions

When using text passages, illustrations and tables from other publications, the author must obtain permission from the copyright holder (usually the original publisher) for use in both the printed and electronic/online versions of the journal.

AI Guidelines

Authors are responsible for their own contributions. The use of AI for translation, linguistic refinement, stylistic improvement, and text structuring is permitted without the need for disclosure.

Any AI-assisted text generation or AI-assisted research of facts, quotations, and literature must be clearly disclosed. In addition, all cited and used sources must be carefully checked, as AI is prone to errors in this regard. Scientific data must not be falsified. Images should not be created or manipulated by AI; in specific cases, such as when creating graphics based on verifiable scientific data, there is a requirement to label them (“AI-generated”).

Submission

Please send your text by email to the publisher's editorial office (see address below). The text should be saved as a Word document. After review by the editorial office, the editorial board and, if applicable, the scientific advisory board, a decision will be made as to whether the manuscript can be published.

Length

- An article should not exceed 4–6 printed pages.
- 1 printed page of text (Word file) = approx. 4900 characters including spaces, with 2 images/2 subheadings approx. 3300 characters.
- 1 printed page = 6 illustrations (8.6 x 5.6 cm) with captions.

For CME articles, a minimum of 27,000 characters applies to the entire article.

Text

- The text should not be written at a specialist level, but in such a way that even an ophthalmologist who is not familiar with the subject area can understand it.
- Nested sentences and nominalised verbs should be avoided.
- The text should be broken up with as many meaningful subheadings as possible (concise mnemonics).
- The text should be saved as a Word file.
- The use of AI in text creation must be indicated, and the editorial team reserves the right not to publish AI-assisted texts.

- The texts are aimed at all genders and are written in the generic masculine form. If gender-neutral language is desired, the feminine and masculine forms (e.g. "die Augenärztinnen und die Augenärzte") may be used. Slash variants, colons, etc. are not permitted.

Summary – German and English

Each article begins with a concise summary of the main content "in 5 sentences" in German and English. Summaries are not introductions, but rather a concise overview of the entire content.

Illustrations

The text should be illustrated in detail and clearly. Please send printable, high-resolution illustrations as separate image files (jpg, tiff or eps), not embedded in the Word document, at a minimum resolution of 300 dpi.

... with captions!

Captions should not consist of just a keyword, but should be detailed and describe to the viewer what they are seeing in detail and what they should pay particular attention to. Each image should have its own caption.

- As short as possible, maximum 20 references
- Abbreviations of journal titles according to the guidelines of Index Medicus.
